Confessional Address

- P During this Lenten season we have heard our Lord's call to intensify our struggle against sin, death, and the devil—all that prevents us from trusting in God and loving each other. Since it is our intention to receive the Holy Supper of our Lord Jesus Christ on this night when He instituted this blessed meal for our salvation, it is proper that we complete our Lenten discipline by diligently examining ourselves, as St. Paul urges us to do. This holy Sacrament has been instituted for the special comfort of those who are troubled because of their sin and who humbly confess their sins, fear God's wrath, and hunger and thirst for righteousness.
- But when we examine our hearts and consciences, we find nothing in us but sin and death, from which we are incapable of delivering ourselves. Therefore, our Lord Jesus Christ has had mercy on us. For our benefit He became man so that He might fulfill for us the whole will and law of God and, to deliver us, took upon Himself our sin and the punishment we deserve.
- So that we may more confidently believe this and be strengthened in the faith and in holy living, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread, broke it, and gave it to His disciples and said: "Take, eat; this is My body, which is given for you." It is as if He said, "I became man, and all that I do and suffer is for your good. As a pledge of this, I give you My body to eat."
- In the same way also He took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying: "Drink of it, all of you; this cup is the new testament in My blood, which is shed for you for the forgiveness of sins." Again, it is as if He said, "I have had mercy on you by taking into Myself all your iniquities. I give Myself into death, shedding My blood to obtain grace and forgiveness of sins, and to comfort and establish the new testament, which gives forgiveness and everlasting salvation. As a pledge of this, I give you My blood to drink."
- Therefore, whoever eats this bread and drinks this cup, confidently believing this Word and promise of Christ, dwells in Christ and Christ in him and has eternal life
- We should also do this in remembrance of Him, showing His death—that He was delivered for our offenses and raised for our justification. Giving Him our most heartfelt thanks, we take up our cross and follow Him and, according to His commandment, love one another as He has loved us. As our Lord on this night exemplified this love by washing His disciples' feet, so we by our words and actions serve one another in love. For we are all one bread and one body, even as we are all partakers of this one bread and drink from the one cup. For just as the one cup is filled with the wine of many grapes and one bread made from countless grains, so also we, being many, are one body in Christ. Because of Him, we love one another, not only in word, but in deed and in truth.

May the almighty and merciful God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, by His Holy Spirit, accomplish this in us.

Old Testament Reading

Exodus 12:1-14

¹The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt, ² This month shall be for you the beginning of months. It shall be the first month of the year for you. ³Tell all the congregation of Israel that on the tenth day of this month every man shall take a lamb according to their fathers' houses, a lamb for a household. ⁴And if the household is too small for a lamb, then he and his nearest neighbor shall take according to the number of persons; according to what each can eat you shall make your count for the lamb. ⁵Your lamb shall be without blemish, a male a year old. You may take it from the sheep or from the goats, ⁶and you shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month, when the whole assembly of the congregation of Israel shall kill their lambs at twilight.

⁷"Then they shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. ⁸They shall eat the flesh that night, roasted on the fire; with unleavened bread and bitter herbs they shall eat it. ⁹Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted, its head with its legs and its inner parts. ¹⁰And you shall let

none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. ¹¹In this manner you shall eat it: with your belt fastened, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand. And you shall eat it in haste. It is the Lord's Passover. ¹²For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike all the firstborn in the land of Egypt, both man and beast; and on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the Lord. ¹³The blood shall be a sign for you, on the houses where you are. And when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague will befall you to destroy you, when I strike the land of Egypt.

Sermon

"The Art of Living by Faith 1 Cor 10:16-17

The cup of blessing that we bless, is it not a participation in the blood of Christ? The bread that we break, is it not a participation in the body of Christ? Because there is one bread, we who are many are one body, for we all partake of the one bread.

We are creatures. God communicates with us through physical things like eyes, ears, mouth, brain etc. This physical interaction is the center of the Lord's Supper. It is the heart of our God interacts with us.

Yet there are many of us who reject this. Different religious objects. Different philosophical ones. They reject the presence of the body and blood of Christ. Here are some of the arguments:

The first argument. God, as we know, is spirit and immaterial. If God is spirit then God doesn't have a body. And nothing in creation — much less a physical body — can contain God. This means that we can only deal with God in the spiritual and immaterial world. But here's the good news that they argue. We are soul and spirit. We exist on two planes. Our bodies are physical and connect us to the earth. The spirit in us draws us up and connects us to God.

This means that our spirits, our consciousness, awareness, however you define it, but rise above our bodies and leave this plane of physical reality to be where God is spiritually. How does this take place? Some argue meditation or contemplative prayer by which the mind becomes detached from body. How do we then know that we're reached this state of enlightenment?

Do you notice the action though? It's about us finding a way or rising up and transcending our bodies and this physical creation in order to meet God where He is — up there somewhere in heaven.

The second objection is not the material world though, it's a misuse of it that impedes a truly spiritual life. The Bible describes things differently though. Our bodies and this physical creation do not impede our life with God. They are the vehicles for God's presence and activity here. The universe cannot contain God, yet God is present in the petals of the smallest flower.

Scripture paints God, and Christ, differently though. God is a down-to-earth God. He gets His hands dirty in the work of daily life. To see this we only need to ask who the actor is? Who comes to whom? It's fair to say that the direction of movement in the Bible is where God comes down from heaven to us, He meets us where we are. He comes here to earth where we can apprehend Him in our physical, spirit-enlivened bodies, bodes given life by the very breath of God. He meets us in and through His creation.

On the sixth day God came down from earth and walked in the Garden of Eden. He met Adam and Eve in the "cool of the day." (Gen 3:8). It's perhaps early in the morning or late in the afternoon or even early evening. God came down to them on earth. He came to them to spend time with them in the garden.

That's not the only time God does this though. He comes down to Moses in the burning bush. He comes down to Mt Sinai. He comes down as a pillar of cloud and fire. God comes down in the most visible flesh and blood body of Jesus Christ. God is this man Jesus. This man Jesus is God.

After the ascension the Spirit comes down up the disciples and into our hearts. On the last day Jesus will come down and to rule earth forever.

As you can see the story of the Bible is not one of ascent, where it's up to us to rise up above our bodies and physical world to some spiritual and ethereal plane to look for God there. Instead, the Bible tells us that we encounter God here on earth in our physical bodies. He comes to us in our mouths in the Lord's Supper.

It is worth pointing out here that in the resurrection our bodies are also raised so that we might see Jesus face to face. We get to hear His voice. We get to touch His wounds like Thomas and join him in proclaiming, "My Lord and My God!" We confess with Job, "I know that My redeemer lives . . . and with my eyes I shall see him."

Tonight is the night before Jesus does upon the cross. He's leaving His disciples, but He will not leave them alone. He institutes His Supper as a last will and testament. And this is something unlike anything else. Here Jesus gifts to the disciples the entire history of Israel. He gives them a covenant and promise which is sealed in the blood of countless sacrifices. This covenant is NEW. It is sealed by the blood of the Son of God not sacrificial animals. And the best part is, this covenant doesn't have to be renewed with repeated sacrifice. It is sealed one and for all in the blood of the Lamb of God.

This covenant unties us with the very body of Jesus. As we partake of the body and blood of Jesus we are united with each other as well. This Supper not only unites us with Jesus and to all of His blessings, but it binds us together into one body. This is why we call it communion, koinonia, fellowship. We share in common the body and the blood of Jesus.

It's interesting that people have no problem thinking that our spirits can somehow be disconnected from our bodies and rise above them to meet God in heaven. Yet they can't accept that Jesus, the Son of God, not only comes to us in a human body, but also now comes to us in His body and blood! This shows a lack of confidence in the Word of God . . . for Word of God can accomplish what He says it will. The words are the main thing in the sacrament.

In the Formula of Concord, the authors ask, who speaks these words? Jesus Christ the almighty and powerful Creator and Lord! He who speaks the words is the same one who uttered a word and entire galaxies with hundreds of millions of stars came into existence! This same word created you and now He brings the body and blood of Jesus to us, in , with and under the bread and wine. God Word does what it says! These words first spoken in an upper room are still effective today when Jesus invites us to His feast.

In conclusion, when a person writes a last will and testament they specify which goods and treasures are to be gifted to those who are left behind. In the sixteenth century they did this as well. However, they also included with their physical possessions, spiritual possessions. They do so by means of a creed or confession of faith, "this is the faith that I will to bequeath to my loved ones, my family and friends!" That's what happened there in the upper room in the first century. Here in the Lord's Supper, Jesus bequeaths to us all that He has to give us, namely, His body and blood!

This very body and blood guarantee us a place at the table of a banquet of all banquets, in the new creation. A feast of fellowship and merriment that God is now preparing for us.
